Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke, Te Rūnanga o Koukourarata, Orton Bradley Park and the Rod Donald Banks Peninsula Trust form the foundation of the Te Ahu Pātiki Trust's board, led by Co-Chairs Roy Tikao and Maureen McCloy, working to uphold as its core kaupapa the maintaining of mana whenua values and the protection of the Maunga.

With over 3,000 donors, grant funding from ECan, Christchurch City Council, Herenga ā Nuku Aotearoa Outdoor Access Commission (formerly Walking Access Commission) and the QEII National Trust the work will now continue to ensure gorse and weed control, pest control, catchment preservation, and conservation protection extending from the maunga to the moana. A QEII National Trust Covenant now protects biodiversity and walking easements guarantee public access in perpetuity as the Park undergoes its journey towards the full restoration of indigenous flora and fauna.

The Jobs for Nature/Mahi mō te Taiao fund has enabled a significant restoration project of the Te Wharau stream

catchment, with over 400 possums already caught and work underway to plant 30,000 native trees.

'Graded Earth' Track builder Matt Coultas has been hard at work upgrading the park's track network. Over the winter he re-routed the Valley Track (part of Mt Herbert Walkway) through Orton Bradley Park. 'This now allows for year-round access within the Te Ahu Pātiki park, and links with access from Kaituna, the Packhorse and the Mt Herbert Summit,' states Founding Trustee Bob Frame. All of the track work was completed to a very high standard providing for good all-year round management vehicle, mountain biking and walking access.

Rod Donald Hut Update

Many thanks to Sophie Hartnell, Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust Volunteer Coordinator, and Jenn Benden and her team from Jacobs Engineering who returned to the Hut for a third time to help out. The weather was perfect as two teams worked planting 55 new trees on the open grassland below the hut and weeding the trees planted the previous year, many of which were well enough established already to have their protective sleeves removed.

Hut Manager David Brailsford worked with a third team further up the hill carrying gravel to improve some slippery areas of the tramping track. One volunteer, Greg, recalled the hut from well back in the 1990s when the Gunn family who built it used to host the occasional mountain biking event on the property. Greg's recollection was of a landscape that was entirely scattered gorse paddocks – a far cry from the incredible naturally regenerating native forest that is now bursting through that gorse over most of the property.

Hut Maintenance

Our Hut Manager has been busy upgrading the old pot belly stove and replacing it with a new Tiny Rad wood burner which will be far more fuel efficient and easier to cook on.

Improvements have also been made to the hut track with the gravelling of sections, new steps, better drainage and gorse control being undertaken.

Although hut usage by international visitors has decreased dramatically due to the pandemic the last two years have shown the highest ever overall occupancy rates, proving the ongoing popularity of this amazing hut!

The Trust, as a member of Pest Free Banks Peninsula, continues supporting projects aiding the vision to see the Peninsula become predator free by 2050.

A very successful Pest Free Banks Peninsula initiative is the feral goat eradication programme, with a recent operation resulting in approximately 800 goats mustered and a further 1,300 goats removed from the landscape in the Southern Bays area.

Rod Donald Trustee Bryan Storey says, 'Feral goats have become a big issue on Banks Peninsula but steady progress is being made to overcome the problem thanks to this project.'





Covenant Support Programme

The Banks Peninsula Conservation Trust continues working to fulfil the eight core goals of its 2050 Ecological Vision for Banks Peninsula. Ongoing programmes enable this work, with grant funding from the Rod Donald Trust assisting with their covenant support programme.

A covenant is a powerful legal mechanism that ensures enduring conservation protection, enhances habitats and encourages biodiversity, while landowners still retain full ownership of their land. More than 90 covenants are already registered with BPCT, who assist landowners by developing a personalised ecological management plan. This information includes everything from fencing advice to guidance on the legal requirements for registering a covenant on the land title.

TE KĀKAHU KAHUKURA

Te Kākahu Kahukura is a large scale collaboration of landowners, residents, organisations and agencies whose vision is to see the Southern Port Hills area become a thriving and resilient indigenous forest supporting native flora and fauna by 2050; a taonga for Ōtautahi. Natural regeneration, restoration planting, targeted enrichment planting of podocarps, and collaborative animal and plant pest control are all important parts of the programme.

The focus of Te Kākahu Kahukura is south of Victoria Park/ Rāpaki, extending towards Gebbies Pass, from the plains to Whakaraupō/Lyttelton Harbour, including Ōtamahua/Quail Island.

In April this year Living Springs hosted the Te Kākahu Kahukura MoU signing, with Yvette Couch-Lewis from Te Hapū o Ngāti Wheke opening the speeches by sharing of the importance of the area and the vision going forward. 18 partner organisations, including the Rod Donald Trust, are signatories to this exciting initiative.



Conservation Volunteers New Zealand Whaka Ora Pest Project

The Trust was delighted to provide Conservation Volunteers New Zealand with a funding grant to assist with their newly established Whaka Ora Pest Project (WOPP). WOPP will coordinate and deliver predator control and invasive pest plant management in various parks, reserves and on private land within the Lyttelton/Whakaraupō area.

CVNZ have the vision of 'inspiring change by connecting people with nature' and by engaging volunteers to make a positive contribution to

conservation landscapes, habitats, species and heritage can be protected.

Some initial project goals include organising pest plant and trapping workshops, weed control work, establishing monitoring and trap lines, and working with schools in the Whakaraupō area providing educational material about pests including a 'How safe is my cat?' programme.
